This is a critical time for our state and we must work together to ensure the health, safety and well-being of all

New Yorkers. However, the suggestion by Governor Cuomo to redistribute ventilators, PPE and other medical

supplies by force is deeply troubling. As we approach the apex of this crisis we cannot create greater risk and

uncertainty for our residents.

For several weeks, our healthcare institutions and local governments have engaged in monumental efforts to

address and prepare for the current crisis and strengthen our medical infrastructure as well as delivery of care.

Upstate medical supplies should not be unilaterally redistributed as we face the COVID-19 peak that the governor

himself says is at our doorstep. Our hospitals and our health care providers must be allowed to help make

decisions on how best to care for the people they serve and not be burdened with additional stress from such

rhetoric. We strongly encourage the governor to reconsider his decision and to work with all hospitals allocating

resources to the proper locations, while ensuring each hospital still has the supplies needed to care for a growing

patient load. In a time of crisis, taking ventilators and other supplies by force leaves people without protection

and hospitals unable to respond to the predicted surge.

In view of Governor Cuomo's comments about resource allocations within the state for COVID-19 management,

the County Board Chair has been in touch with our regional health care leaders and continues to monitor the

situation with them. At this point, their view is that it is possible to offer selective assistance to NYC and the

downstate region without jeopardizing the ability to meet the care requirements for our local region. We have

been assured that if those circumstances begin to change, health care leaders will inform the board and we will

collectively take the necessary actions to insure the levels of service required for the residents of our region.

We will continue to work with the Department of Health, medical providers and community leaders, as well as

state government, to find innovative solutions to meet these challenges while caring for our current and future

patients. Our supplies are not large, but we will do what we can. Our doctors, nurses, first responders, and others

on the front lines continue to risk their health and safety to protect the lives of everyone. We must ensure these

professionals have the resources to face that task. We welcome the opportunity to engage with our partners in

the development of a collaborative plan that doesn't jeopardize local resources.
